





Summer School Considerations



> Full Credit Summer School Considerations

- Students can choose to attempt up to 2 full academic courses (worth 4 credits each) over the summer.
- Please consult the Richmond Virtual School (Registration will start Feb 20/24) or Richmond Continuing Education (Registration TBA) for more information about available courses. Please be aware that French Immersion students will not complete their FI graduation requirements by completing Socials, Science, or Career Life Education courses during the summer, because the language of instruction is English.
- If you plan to register for summer school courses, <u>please</u> indicate this in the bottom right-hand box on your program <u>planning sheet "Programming Notes"</u> and then select the next level course on the main part of your sheet i.e. if you are planning to take math 11 over the summer you will select a math 12 course or another elective for next year.

Specific Things to consider for G12s...

➤ Career Preparation/Work Experience Course

Career Prep 12 (Health Sciences, Physical and Health Education, Art, Human Services, Theatre), is a 4 credit asynchronous course (running outside the timetable) that allows you to volunteer in a placement in the field of your choosing (in consultation with your supervising teacher). In the past, for CP Health Sciences 12, we have had students volunteer in areas such as physiotherapy, pharmacy, optometry, veterinary medicine, and many more.





Specific Things to consider for G12s...

➤ Study Blocks: often G12s may elect to take one study block. Please keep in mind that in order to be considered a full-time student at McRoberts, you are only permitted to have two non-enrolling classes in your schedule. Students who are not full time are not eligible for school-based scholarships.





Specific things to consider for G11s...

➤ Post-secondary options: this is often one of the biggest considerations for G11 students and requires significant research, planning and a growing awareness of available options enhanced by your participation and learning in your Career Life Education course.

Important questions related to post-secondary planning:

- What are my strengths & weaknesses, likes & dislikes?
- How do I build awareness of career and post-secondary opportunities?
- What post-secondary programs will allow me to pursue my potential career(s) of choice?
- What are the post-secondary pre-requisites? (grade 11 & 12 courses) examples: do I need a 2nd language? what math level do I need? which science(s) do I need? how many academic grade 12 courses are required? do I need to incorporate full credit summer school into my plan?
- What if I don't know where to start? How do I cover my bases to ensure I don't eliminate future opportunities?
- ➤ Here's where we can direct you towards 3 main school-based resources.





1 - MyBlueprint

- MyBlueprint is an online education and career planning platform that is freely available to all grade 8-12 Richmond School District students. The purpose of MyBlueprint is to support students in thinking and planning for their futures to help guide them to increased success in schools.
- Students can take learning style, personality, interest, knowledge and motivation assessments to learn more about themselves as well as to guide them to different career and education opportunities.
- Students can plan their high school courses and investigate post-secondary career, job and volunteer opportunities. They also can create/plan budgets, build career portfolios and resumes.
- Students have a username and password which allows them to log on to MyBlueprint. If they have trouble logging on, they should consult with Mr. Malchy (Portable 5). If you do not have a MyBlueprint account please refer to instructions about how to open one on the program planning page on the McRoberts website: students>program planning. All grade 10-12 students are encouraged to access MyBlueprint in order to assist with their future program planning decisions.



2 – Career and Post-Secondary Advisor – Ms. E. Tang

We are so fortunate to have our own specialist career and post-secondary advisor here at McRoberts. Ms. E. Tang is based in the counselling centre of McRoberts school and is available on Tuesdays, Thursdays and alternating Fridays to meet with students. You can email her at etang@sd38.bc.ca to make an appointment or drop by her office (across from the Snack Shack) to sign up for an appointment.

It helps Ms. Tang to prepare for meetings if questions can be communicated to her in advance of your meeting.

Ms. Tang also has a careers website which is regularly updated with post-secondary information and career options. 4 – Consultation with Post Secondaries Directly

A majority of your research will be spent exploring post-secondary institutions online.

- ➤ Find out where you can pursue further studies/training in your chosen area. (University? College? Private Institute? Local? Provincial? National? International?)

- Consider <u>more than 1</u> institution. Go to each institution's website for the most up-to-date information.
- Admission requirements are institution-specific. (i.e. Admission to UBC Science is different from SFU Science see above).
- Check admission requirements for the institution <u>AND</u> the program of study.






College and University Applications

- Admission requirements for colleges and universities can vary greatly, and admission into university is often far more competitive.
- ➤ Therefore, if you are sure you want to go to university it is also worth considering applying to a college too. Many of our students apply to at least one college (sometimes with a plan to transfer to university later), alongside their university application/s, which we strongly encourage all students to do, as there is no such thing as guaranteed admission anywhere.
- For those who know they would like to go on to study at college we strongly recommend applying early (and places are given on a 'first-come-first-served' basis) to more than one institution in case places fill up quickly.





"WORKING BACKWARDS"



Please keep in mind it's helpful when selecting courses for G12 to employ the concept of "working backwards" - for example investigating a number of potential career choices, in order to identify the post-secondary options required to pursue those careers, in order to identify the G12 courses needed to meet the admission requirements for those postsecondary programs.

G12 Course Selection Summary

- > Select a course load that is manageable and ensures graduation.
- > Do your research and if in doubt ask and seek help.
- > Start as early as possible, as good choices often come from extensive research.
- > Select a course load that will keep as many of your post-secondary options as open as possible.
- Ensure you have selected at least six enrolling classes to maintain eligibility for scholarship consideration in your G12 year.
- ➤ Review and consider your extra-curricular commitments job, clubs, teams, etc.
- ➤ Factor in Grade 12 responsibilities Capstone / CLC, applications for admissions, scholarships etc.





Please make sure that your selections in MyEd *match* the courses you selected on your Course Selection Sheet!


