Section 6: District/Authority Scholarship

There are 5500 District/Authority Scholarships distributed across school districts and independent school authorities that recognize graduating BC students for **excellence** in their chosen area of interest or strength. Winners receive a \$1250 scholarship voucher to use towards their post-secondary tuition.

These scholarships are available to graduating students who have demonstrated <u>outstanding achievement in their chosen field of</u> interest or strength in any of the following 7 areas:

- Indigenous Languages and Cultures
 - demonstrated at school or in the community
- Fine Arts

(e.g. Visual Arts, Dance, Drama, Music)

Applied Skills

(e.g. Business, Technology, Home Economics, Information Communication Technology)

Physical Activity

(e.g. Athletics, Dance, Gymnastics, not limited to Physical Education)

International Languages

(International Languages Curriculum or External Language Assessments, including AP or IB courses)

- Community Service (Volunteer Activity)
 - which includes demonstration of local and global issues and cultural awareness
 - does not include school service
- Technical and Trades Training

(e.g. Carpentry, Automotive, Mechanics, Cook Training)
